

One week later, on June 14, the first Sunday School class was held at the school. Later that afternoon, the church was officially organized, adopting the name **Berea Methodist Church**. Thirty-one people became the first members of the newly formed congregation.

During the next several months, worship services, meetings, and church socials continued to meet at the school and in the homes of church members. The first celebration of Holy Communion was in the BHS auditorium October 4. With no altar in the auditorium, the front row of seats was used as the altar.

Later that same month, property was acquired on White Horse Road and building plans were adopted for an education building.
